- 4. Neena Beber mentions in an interview that live theater allows her to "process reality and question and observe and maybe even create new ways of seeing." What is looking? What is seeing? What, if any, is the difference between the two? Think of the two characters in the play—what do they look at? What do they see? What "new ways of seeing" does *Misreadings* create?
- 5. What kind of sight or insight comes from living? Socrates is said to have remarked that "The life which is unexamined is not worth living." How do you see Simone and Ruth measuring up to this suggestion?
- 6. Why do you think this short play is called *Misreadings*? Reread some of the following words, phrases, or sentences from the play. What meanings do they have throughout the piece? Is ten minutes short or long? What about a smoke? What about *Anna Karenina*? What misreadings do the characters make? What misreadings did you make as you "studied" this script? Think about how you were fooled. Do certain words trip you up? Or do certain actions trigger a set association? Note as well sentence structure and the dynamics of the Ruth-Simone exchange.
